## Girl Scouts Update

The Downtown Optimist Club listened to our first speaker of 2022 on Friday, January 21.

**Laura Baltz**, Director of FUNdraising and Vice President of Fund Development at our local Girl Scouts of America chapter had us smiling at her stories and ready to support the girls in any way we can. This year, GSA has already provided girls with \$26,000 of scholarship money. Some girls need membership fees quietly paid; others need help with uniforms. Girls Scouts of America strives to help any girl who wants to become a scout, but is financially unable to do so. The Girls Scouts help girls gain confidence, learn business and customer service skills, and in general, open up a world of new experiences for many of their scouts! The girls learn that there are people in their communities

who will help them – AND – that there is always something the girls can do for their communities. It is important to give back!

There are four pillars to the Girls Scout philosophy – STEM education, Outdoors, Life Skills, and Entrepreneurship. The girls have fun while earning badges, helping their community, and deepening friendships. They learn problem solving and to look at the world differently. Activities promote curiosity, kindness, and a can-do spirit.

Here are a few interesting Girls Scout facts. GSA utilizes over ten thousand volunteers annually. Over 73% of all female senators are former girls scouts. There are over 2.6 million girl and adult Girl Scout members worldwide. Finally, there are 59 million American women alive today who participated in Girl Scouts as they grew up. The Girls Scouts make quite an impact!

Founded on March 12, 1912 the Girls Scouts still earn their traditional awards. They work as a troop to earn their bronze stars and in small groups to earn their silver stars. The Girl Scout Gold award is earned individually by less than 6% of all Girls Scouts.

Girl Scouts do fundraising. Our local Girls Scouts hold a Cocktails at Camp evening in September. At this casual affair, attendees get to do what the girls do at camp, along with listening to live bands, enjoying the fare of food trucks, and simply having fun! ...
